**Description**

The Texas Public Policy Foundation, a non-profit, non-partisan research institute, seeks a part-time policy analyst to perform research on the state's criminal justice system.

This is a part-time, temporary, contract labor research position that will likely end in early 2009, but potentially earlier or later. This position will not have an office at the Foundation, and will work from home or other place of business the candidate chooses to work.

This position will pay \$12-20 per hour depending upon experience.

**Responsibilities**

- Gather and assimilate facts and data on juvenile justice and adult corrections systems.
- Draft documents and reports summarizing findings.
- Participate in staff meetings.
