

A CALL TO TEXAS CATHOLIC LEADERS TO SUPPORT PARENT EMPOWERMENT AND ESAS

KEY POINTS

- Parents have both the responsibility and right to educate their children.
- The State's role is to support parents, not replace them.
- ESAs empower parents and increase student achievement.

IN PRACTICE

Empowering parents helps children. For example, in 1998, Florida's low-income students ranked #34 in the nation on reading and #27 in math. With choice, today they are #1. In the words of one graduate:

A PARENT'S ROLE AS EDUCATOR

According to Texas law, "parental involvement in the school is essential for the maximum educational achievement of a child."¹ Catholic teaching takes this a step further:

[Parents'] role as educators is so decisive that scarcely anything can compensate for their failure. It devolves on parents to create a family atmosphere so animated with love and reverence for God and others that a well-rounded personal and social development will be fostered among the children. Hence, the family is the first school of those social virtues which every society needs.²

Accordingly, parents have both the responsibility and the right to educate their children.

THE STATE'S ROLE IN EDUCATION

According to the Catholic teaching of *subsidiarity*, the state should empower and respect parents.³ As Pope Francis teaches:

The State offers educational programs in a subsidiary way, supporting the parents in their indeclinable role; parents themselves enjoy the right to choose freely the kind of education—accessible and of good quality—which they wish to give their children in accordance with their convictions. Schools do not replace parents but complement them.⁴

A CALL TO EMPOWER PARENTS

We believe that Texas parents should be empowered with greater transparency, quality,

respect, and choices in their child's education. Education Savings Accounts (ESAs) are a key program that does so.

ESAs have funds that allow parents to pay for tuition at any accredited school of the parent's choosing, as well as for tutoring, books, transportation, or other approved educational expenses. Thirty-one states have similar programs and 14 have ESAs.
