THE TEXAS JOB MARKET HAS ABUNDANT HIGH-WAGE OPPORTUNITIES THAT DO NOT **REOUIRE COLLEGE DEGREES:**

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION ALLOTMENT


Students only have access to programs of study chosen by school administrators. The state gives schools \$2.3 billion as a CTE allotment (in addition to other grants and funds), but schools are only required to spend 55% of the allotment on CTE, incentivizing schools to offer cheap CTE programs and pocket the rest.

UNTAPPED POTENTIAL

Community and technical colleges offer programs for high-wage, in demand jobs, and 92% of Texas students live within a 30-minute drive of a community or technical college.

With an Educational Savings Account, students can use their ESA funds to enroll in a high-quality program at their local community or technical college and leave high school ready for a high-paying career.
