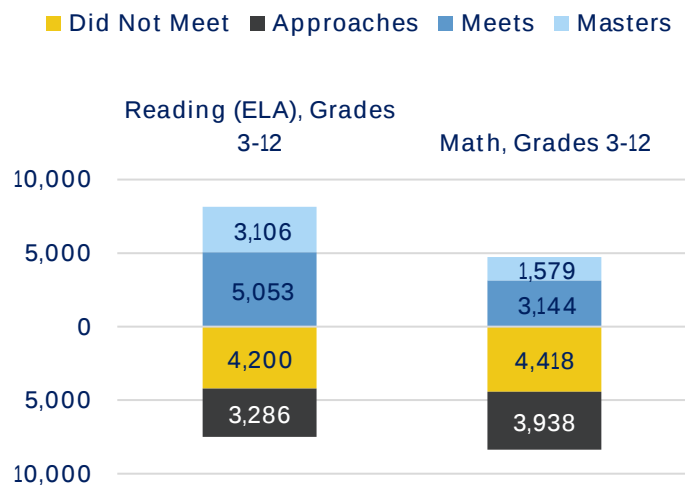
Educational Quality in House District 116, 2023-2024 School Year

Reading and math proficiency is one key sign of quality. Of all students in House District 116:

- 7,486 (47.9%) are below grade level in Reading (ELA), and
- 8,356 (63.9%) are below grade level in Mathematics.

Students at Approaches or Did Not Meet will need targeted intervention to succeed in the next grade. Statewide, 97% of students who fall behind do not catch up.

Schools, 2023-24 School Year

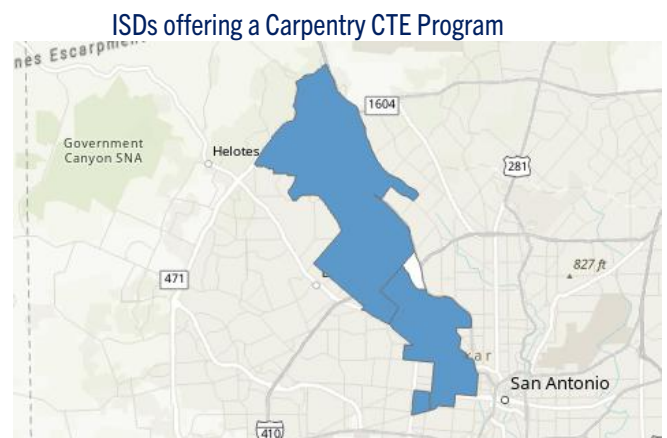

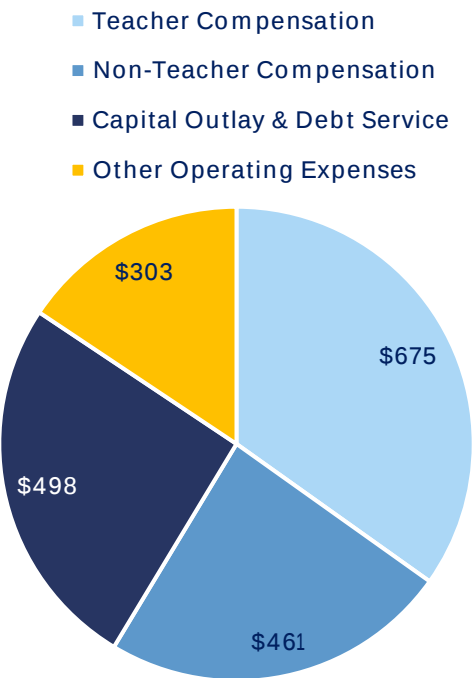
School District Expenditures in House District 116

Leaders should ask how well resources - people, time, and money - are deployed to meet student needs. ISDs in HD 116 spent \$18,971 per student. Of this, spending consists

- 35% (\$6,610) for teacher salaries & benefits;
- 24% (\$4,516) on salaries & benefits for non-teachers, esp. administrative, clerical, facilities, & counseling staff;
- 16% (\$2,967) for other operating costs, esp. consumable supplies, technology, & consultants; and
- 26% (\$4,878) for capital and debt service.

Parents best know their children and should have a central role in deciding how people, time, and money are deployed to support their education.

Texas Republican Voters support Parental Empowerment in March 2024

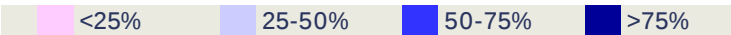
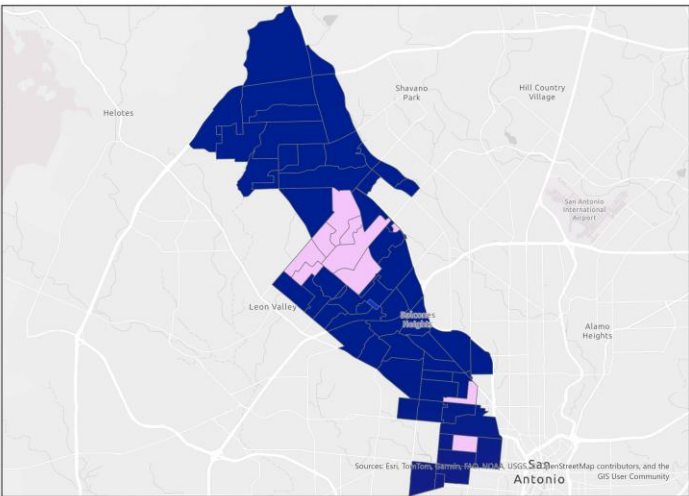
In 2024, Texans voted on this proposition:

"Texas parents and guardians should have the right to select schools, whether public or private, for their children, and the funding should follow the student."
