Educational Quality in House District 58, 2023-2024 School Year

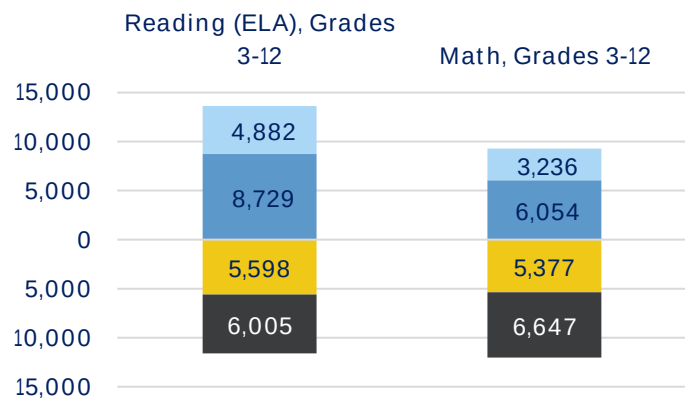
Reading and math proficiency is one key sign of quality. Of all students in House District 58:

- 11,603 (46.0%) are below grade level in Reading (ELA), and
- 12,024 (56.4%) are below grade level in Mathematics.

Students at Approaches or Did Not Meet will need targeted intervention to succeed in the next grade. Statewide, 97% of students who fall behind do not catch up.

 ■ Masters



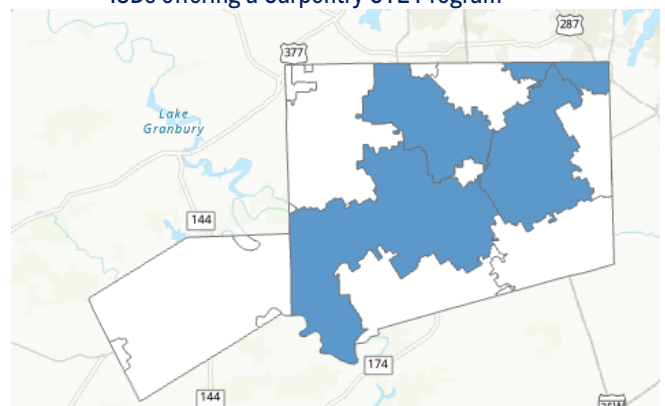
